TIP: The answer might suggest that a rescue dog (that's already well-trained) might suit best.								


2. COULD I FEED, WALK AND PLAY WITH A DOG ON A REGULAR BASIS?

With food, grooming, vet expenses and insurance, the average cost of owning a pet adds up to \$114 per month.1



4. IS ANYONE IN THE FAMILY ALLERGIC TO DOGS?

Some breeds are more prone to causing allergic reactions than others. Poodles, Schnauzers and other hypoallergenic breeds should move to the top of your list if allergies are an issue.

5. WHAT DOES THE FUTURE LOOK LIKE?

While your growing family may all pitch in to help now, what happens if you're left with an empty nest (and are keen to hit the road) in five or 10 years time? Will the dog breed you have in mind enjoy going along for the ride?
